The Trinity College Centre for Digital Humanities is recruiting for a research position lasting up to 4 years to join its growing and diverse team. The primary purpose of this post is to contribute to the development of DARIAH-IE, Ireland's national infrastructure for the digitally engaged arts and humanities.

The <u>Digital Research Infrastructure for the Arts and Humanities</u> (DARIAH) supports researchers working in the diverse community of practice known as the Arts and Humanities to build, analyse and interpret digital or hybrid resources. DARIAH's mission is to empower research communities with digital methods to create, connect and share knowledge about culture and society.

Established since 2014 as a European Research Infrastructure Consortium (ERIC), DARIAH, with its 23 member countries, is a network of people, expertise, information, knowledge, content, methods, tools and technologies. By working with communities of practice, DARIAH brings together individual state-of-the-art digital Arts and Humanities activities and scales their results to a European level. It preserves, provides access to and disseminates research that stems from these collaborations and ensures that best practices, methodological and technical standards are followed.

Trinity College Dublin has recently been named as the DARIAH Ireland National Coordinating Institution for the period of September 2024 until August 2028, under the leadership of Prof. Jennifer Edmond, DARIAH-IE National Coordinator. This activity will be based in the TCD Centre for Digital Humanities, alongside DARIAH-EU's Dublin Coordination Office.

Duties and Responsibilities of the Post

The appointee will work closely and collaboratively with the National Coordinator to meet the milestones for the development of DARIAH-IE as agreed between the Irish Research Council (DARIAH-IE National Representative body) and Trinity. The duties will include:

- Undertaking collaborative research with Dr Edmond to determine the scope, nature
 and penetration of digital humanities and arts research in Ireland. This will build
 upon previous work, such as the 2021 <u>Digital Humanities Landscape</u> report, and the
 knowledge held by national subject associations and broader representative groups
 (such as the IHA and the RIA). This will consist of both desk research and direct user
 engagement to determine user needs.
- Propose mechanisms and interventions to meet the community requirements that are
 discovered through analysis of data gathered in the scope of the research tasks.
 These may include awareness-raising work, such as identifying and disseminating
 best practices from elsewhere in the DARIAH-EU network to an Irish audience, or be
 more hand-on and skills focussed.
- Plan and deliver 2-3 community and skills-building intervention events per annum to either build community awareness (eg for audiences of primarily ECRs or in institutions with less-established DH presence) or to offer access to particular skill sets, contexts or approaches (such as text mining, spatial humanities or approaches to specific data-types).
- Plan and deliver regular welcome webinars, to introduce DARIAH and its associated services to researchers who express an interest in learning more about it.
- Propose a relevant model for a national digital methods helpdesk and networking function.
- Promote Irish utilisation of DARIAH-EU infrastructural components, such as the SSH Open Marketplace, DARIAH Campus, Working Groups, Annual Event, etc..
- Assist in the preparation and planning for the semi-annual meetings of the National Coordination Committee, as well as the annual gathering and reporting of national in-kind contributions to DARIAH-EU.
- Be prepared to attend DARIAH-EU events as required, in particular the Annual Event (F2F) and monthly National Coordinator meetings.
- Other tasks/duties as assigned by the National Coordinator and/or Deputy National Coordinator.

Person Specification

Applicants for this position are required to:

- Have experience of empirical research methods, and of the digital humanities landscape in Ireland;
- Have excellent oral and written communication skills, with the proven capacity and confidence to communicate effectively, engagingly and creatively with a wide range of audiences across media;
- Be highly adept at working collaboratively and in an integrated team environment

- Be a resourceful, conscientious and self-motivated individual with a 'can do attitude' and ability to see tasks through to completion
- Be able to manage competing priorities and maintain a high level of professionalism when working under pressure;
- Show discretion and a professional approach to all activities.

Applicants for this position are desired to:

- Have experience of working in a research lab, cultural heritage or professional environment
- Hold or be nearing completion of a relevant advanced degree (ideally PhD, but applicants with a Masters will also be considered) relevant to the digital humanities.
- Have excellent, proven academic writing and analysis skills

Our 10-year track record of externally-funded **research projects** covers a wide range of topics, with particular strengths in the development of research environments and infrastructures for the digital humanities, and the application of digital humanities insights to wider social, cultural and technical challenges (eg. critical digital humanities approaches). Among our projects have been signature EU-funded initiatives such as CENDARI, PARTHENOS, KPLEX, ECloud, PROVIDE DH, CLS-INFRA and KT4D. We also host one of the four Coordination Offices of the DARIAH ERIC (www.dariah.eu), a pan-European research infrastructure for the arts and humanities.

The DH@TCD Centre also has a strong commitment to building accessible **infrastructure** for digital humanities in our home institute and institution. The Centre Steering Committee

aligns activities at a University level, while individual Centre staff act as consultants for a wide range of projects at their inception phase. The Centre also strongly supports Trinity's **Postgraduate Programme in Digital Humanities and Culture** (see: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wnRGP8xihJg&t=1s), which is based in the School of Languages, Literatures and Cultural Studies. This one-year programme, which can be taken as a PG Certificate, PG Diploma or full Masters degree, introduces students to the basic discourses, contexts and tools of the field, preparing them for a wide range of professional and research opportunities.

Although the Centre supports a wide range of working modalities to accommodate the needs of its staff, the position will be physically based in the Trinity Long Room Hub, Trinity College Dublin's Research Institute for the arts and humanities, which makes its home in the Hub's beautiful facility on historic Fellow's Square.
